Lilac Girls by Martha Hall Kelly

Based on a true story of a New York socialite who championed a group of concentration camp survivors known as the Rabbits, *Lilac Girls* reveals a story of love, redemption and terrible secrets that were hidden for decades.



The Little Paris Bookshop by Nina George

Monsieur Perdu calls himself a literary apothecary. Using his intuitive feel for the exact book a reader needs, Perdu mends broken hearts and souls. The only person he can't seem to heal through literature is himself, still haunted by heartbreak after his great love disappeared.



Mrs. Fletcher by Tom Perrotta

Eve Fletcher, 46 and divorced, is dealing with an empty nest when her only son leaves for college. A mysterious text message from an anonymous number on her phone leads her to explore a porn website featuring ordinary, middle-aged women like herself. Eve's online fixations begin to spill into real life that lead to morally fraught situations.

This is a story about the power of family and what money does to relationships. The Plumb family stands out as spectacularly dysfunctional. An accident endangers the Plumbs' joint trust fund, "The Nest," which they are months away from finally receiving.




Pachinko by Min Jin Lee

Her decision to abandon her home and reject her son's powerful father sets off a dramatic saga that will echo down through the generations.




A Piece of the World by Christina Baker Kline


Saints for All Occasions by J. Courtney Sullivan

We follow the story from 1958 to contemporary New England, Ireland and New York, exploring how siblings and children relate to their parents and each other as they age.



The Storied Life of A. J. Fikry by Gabrielle Zevin

A middle-aged bookseller mourning his lost wife, a feisty publisher's rep, and a charmingly precocious abandoned child come together on a small island off the New England coast in this utterly delightful novel of love and second chances.

Beloved by Toni Morrison

Sethe was born a slave and escaped to Ohio, but 18 years later she is still not free. She has too many memories of Sweet Home, the beautiful farm where so many hideous things happened. Her new home is haunted by the ghost of her baby, who died nameless and whose tombstone is engraved with a single word: Beloved.

The Book Thief by Markus Zusak

Death tells the story of a young German girl, Liesel, whose book-stealing and story-telling talents during World War II help sustain her family and the Jewish man they are hiding, as well as their neighbors.

Colour Bar by Susan Williams

This is the inspiring true story of Seretse Khama and Ruth Williams, whose interracial marriage sent shockwaves through the establishment, defied an empire and, finally, triumphed over the prejudices of their age.

Hidden Figures by Margot Lee Shetterly

As the United States raced against Russia to put a man in space, NASA found untapped talent in a group of African-American female mathematicians that served as the brains behind one of the greatest operations in U.S. history.




Being Mortal by Atul Gawande


Hillbilly Elegy by J.D. Vance

Hillbilly Elegy is a passionate and personal analysis of a culture in crisis, that of white working-class Americans. The decline of this group, a demographic of our country that has been slowly disintegrating over forty years. J. D. Vance tells the true story of what a social, regional and class decline feels like when you were born with it hung around your neck.



The Radium Girls by Kate Moore

This is the story of hundreds of young, vibrant women who were sentenced to death by their employers. The so-called "Radium Girls" painted luminescent faces on clock and watch dials using a paint mixture that contained radium. Instructed to "lip-point" their brushes as they painted, they absorbed high doses of radium into their bodies. When the effects of the radium led to horrific disfigurement and pain, the company refused to take responsibility.
